Thank you for supporting your children and our school staff this past fortnight. We are looking forward to seeing our East Bentleigh student's smiling faces back in their learning spaces from 8:50 am tomorrow for learning time.

COVID Safe School Operations

I have been waiting for the latest 'School Operations Guide' which has just landed at 10:30 this morning in order to advise you of the most up to date arrangements.

Once again external visitors will not be able to join us onsite. Parents also should minimise any time onsite. If you are able to leave your child at the gate that would be preferable. If not, as stated above please limit your time onsite and wear a mask. Parents are able to enter the main building to access the office, only if absolutely necessary and in doing so must QR code, check in, sanitise their hands and wear a face mask as per CHO guidelines.

Access to the office will be through the **front door** only. As we will need to adhere strictly to density limits, please ensure there are no more than 4 people at the office area at one time.

Parents are reminded not to enter any of the learning areas of the school. All meetings with school staff will be via Webex for the remainder of the term. This will include SSG's (Student Support Group) meetings and parent teacher meetings. In keeping with minimising crowded environments, sadly our Thursday market will cease for the remainder of the term. We will advise when we are in a position to resume this much loved event. The breakfast club program has been deemed to be an essential service so this will resume tomorrow.

Aside from the above, we will attempt to function as close to normal as possible. It will just be great to have our students back. The following excerpt in italics is taken from a DET communication received in schools late yesterday in relation to the wearing of masks.

From 11.59pm Thursday 10 June, consistent with advice for the broader community, school staff and secondary school students aged 12 or older, must wear a face mask at school, unless an exception applies:

- * in all indoor spaces
- * in all outdoor spaces when 1.5m physical distance cannot be maintained (such as the southern side of the school at pick up and drop off times)
- * when travelling to and from school on public transport.

Visitors and parents must also observe this guidance.

The wellbeing of all our students is our priority and our school staff are here to support you and your family. Information that might be of assistance to you in talking to your child about COVID-19 is available. If you are concerned about your wellbeing or that of your child, please contact us so we can talk with you about how we can best assist. Other sources of support include: Parent Line 13 22 89 and Kids Helpline 1800 55 1800.

A reminder that if you, your child, or a family member develops symptoms of COVID-19, you should <u>get</u> tested at a COVID-19 testing facility and stay home.

Each family should regularly check the <u>list of public exposure sites in Victoria</u> (where a person with COVID-19 has attended), and if anyone in the family has attended a site at the times listed, follow the instructions aiven.

If you are eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccination, please check out the <u>website</u> for information and bookings. Like getting tested if you have symptoms, getting vaccinated goes a long way to keeping our communities safe and schools open.

Update - I have just heard the 1:00pm news on the ABC which indicates that the advice regarding mask wearing has changed. **Everyone is now required to wear masks both inside and outside**. In other news......

Student Reports



This week we are taking a look at.... Puzzles and Problems

Today's problems come from Nrich https://nrich.maths.org/ and are all about thinking mathematically and are visual spatial related.

Let's Investigate Triangles

Age 5 to 7

Vincent and Tara are making triangles with the class construction set. They have a pile of strips of different lengths.

There are:

yellow strips with 3 holes

black strips with 4 holes,

red strips with 5 holes and

green strips with 6 holes.

There are plenty of strips of each colour.





Vincent makes a triangle with a **green** strip, a **yellow** strip and a **red** strip.





Tara makes a triangle with two **green** strips and one **red** strip and another triangle with three **black** strips.

How many different triangles can you make with these lengths? Can you find three strips which cannot be made into a triangle when you use them together?









Four Colours Age 5 to 11

Kate has eight multilink cubes. She has two red ones, two yellow, two green and two blue.

She wants to fit them together to make a cube so that each colour shows on each face just once.

Is it possible? If so, how? If you've found a way, is there another way?

Do It Yourself Stress Balls


You will need a balloon, funnel and some flour.

Making the most of your parent-teacher interview

It makes sense for you as a parent to be prepared and ready to make the most of the brief time you have with teachers.



Parent-teacher interviews provide a great opportunity for you as a parent to find out how your child is progressing at school.

Many parent-teacher interviews are tightly scheduled and can seem a little rushed. Teachers are generally highly organised so they can make the most of the time you have together.

It makes sense also for you as a parent to be prepared and ready to make the most of the brief time you have with teachers.

Here are some guidelines to make the most of these interviews:

- 1. Prepare well. Before the interview, list any questions that you want to raise. Keep questions short and to the point.
- 2. Attend with a partner or friend particularly if you are nervous or unsure. It is easy to miss a point and often difficult to relay information to a partner.
- 3. Give the teacher a chance to make an assessment of your child's progress. This may seem obvious but some interviews never get off the ground because enthusiastic parents take over.
- 4. Take notes and clarify information that you don't understand. "What do you mean by 'he needs to spend more time reading'...?" Make sure you have a good understanding of the messages your child's teacher is giving.
- 5. Be prepared to give an assessment of your child's performance. You may be asked how you think your child is performing so give an honest, but realistic assessment.

6. Ask how you can help your child if there are any areas that need to be strengthened. No doubt your child's teacher will have some strategies for you to assist your child, so make sure you have a clear understanding before you leave.

If there are unresolved issues or you wish to discuss your child's difficulties in greater detail, consider asking for another interview. This is being respectful of the teacher's time and of those parents who are to follow.

Once the interview is over consider how you will discuss it with your child.

Avoid giving generalisations or simplistic appraisals such as: "The teacher says you are a good girl."

Discuss areas that need work in positive terms. Talk about strengths or successes first before discussing areas that may need more work.

A clear message such as, "We talked about your reading and the teacher suggested that we should try..." is far more helpful.

Involve your child in discussing any plans for improvement. Avoid making big plans for your child to improve in a subject area without consulting him or her. By involving children and taking notice of their ideas plans are more likely to be successful.

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
