Hello everyone,

I hope that you are managing to keep warm as we experience the last throes of a very cold winter. Lengthening days are just one of the markers that our seasons are changing, as are some early blossoms on some trees with the accompanying sweet smell of spring early in the morning as I arrive at school.

We will also soon be preparing our letters of offer for our new intake of Prep students for 2022, another marker that we are well and truly in the second half of the year and beginning to plan for the 2022 school year, which is always an exciting time in the life of any school.

Thank you to all our families for understanding why we need to limit the access to our school buildings and grounds. I acknowledge that this is a less than perfect scenario, however as we are unable to safely physically distance at these times, it is a practice we need to observe. I assure you that our neighbouring network schools are following the same practices.

A reminder that we have staggered start and pick up times to minimise congestion at these busy times. I ask that you please adhere to these times, continue to drop your child(ren) off quickly after 8:45am and leave the school areas promptly after pickup in the afternoon.

To avoid the congestion that occurred this morning the front gate will be unlocked. In order to ensure child safety, it will be locked after drop off. A reminder that no child should be at school until 8.45am, (unless at OSHC), as there is no adult supervision before that time.

The staff car park is strictly out of bounds for student access. Families wishing to utilise breakfast club should enter through the front gate, with children walking down the pathway and into the PAC where they will be met by ES staff and cared for until 8.45am when they will be directed to their classroom line ups.. A reminder too that the back gate will also be unlocked at these times to allow students to enter the grounds.

2021 Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Opinion Survey

East Bentleigh Primary School is conducting a survey in the coming weeks to gauge current parent opinion about our school. Evidence shows that gender-based violence can be prevented by working with the whole population to address the attitudes, beliefs and knowledge that supports the prevention of violence.

Studies show that school-based violence prevention and Respectful Relationship initiatives can produce lasting changes in attitudes and behaviours.

Respectful Relationships Education in Schools was trialled across 19 schools, reaching 1,700 teachers and 4,000 students. The trial found that the initiative had a positive effect on students' attitudes, knowledge and skills, as well as, school policies, culture and ethos. The following represents some of the myths around the Respectful Relationships program. These myths create confusion and

The following represents some of the myths around the Respectful Relationships program. These myths create confusion an misunderstandings. In some cases, these myths have been perpetrated by the media through one sided, or false reporting.

Myth: Respectful Relationships teaches radical gender theory.

Fact: Respectful Relationships does not teach radical gender theory. It is a primary prevention initiative to reduce family violence. Respectful Relationships promotes respect and gender equality and helps students learn how to build healthy relationships. It prepares students to face challenges by developing problem-solving skills and building resilience and confidence. Schools involved in the Respectful Relationships initiative are building a culture of respect and gender equality, by looking at their practices and policies to drive meaningful change.

Myth: Respectful relationships education teaches boys to feel ashamed and girls to feel like victims

Fact: This is simply not true. None of the activities in the Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships teaching and learning materials teach students to feel ashamed, or feel like victims. Respectful Relationships promotes respect and equality and helps boys as well as girls learn how to build healthy relationships.

Myth: The Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships teaching and learning materials are not age appropriate

Fact: The Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships teaching and learning materials were developed by leading education experts, who tailored the materials to each year level from Foundation to year 12 and made sure all information is age-appropriate and grounded in evidence.

Myth: Respectful Relationships and the Safe Schools program are the same

Fact: Respectful Relationships and Safe Schools are two very different initiatives.

Safe Schools is a about creating inclusive and safe environments for all students, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex (LGBTI) students. Safe Schools seeks to prevent, and respond to, discrimination against LGBTI students. Safe Schools is not part of the Victorian Curriculum.

Respectful Relationships is part of the curriculum. It promotes respect and gender equality and helps students learn how to build healthy relationships.

Myth: This initiative is trying to say that boys can't play with trucks and girls can't play with dolls

Fact: Absolutely not. This initiative is not seeking to make children 'gender neutral' or trying to prevent girls from playing with dolls, or boys with trucks. Respectful Relationships is about creating an environment in which children are not restricted by gender stereotypes and are free to explore and play as they choose.

Myth: The Respectful Relationships is a sex education program

Fact: Respectful Relationships is separate to sex education in the curriculum.

Collaborative parenting style wins the day during COVID-19



The close quarter living that most of us have experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic has tested the patience and communications skills of even the most assured parent. The constancy of members living together is a test of family management skills, revealing any flaws or limitations that exist.

Those that rely on a coercive ("do as I say") approach probably discovered that dominance works well in small doses, but fails miserably over the long-term, with family harmony severely impacted.

Parents who use a laissez-faire ("she'll be right") approach may have found that one or more children struggled with a lack of structure. In the absence of positive leadership, a child more than likely stepped up to fill the void, rendering parents with limited influence.

Those who used a parallel ("you go your way, I'll go mine") approach may have experienced a relatively quiet parental existence, but this will more than likely come at the expense of group cohesion and children's mental health.

Collaborative family leadership

Life in the family cocoon has suited parents that use a more inclusive, collaborative parenting style. This is a style that gives children a voice, commensurate with their developmental stages, in how the family conducts itself.

Features of a collaborative family

Parents who adopt a collaborative approach impact family culture in positive ways, so that their family becomes a collaborative unit. Here are some features shared by collaborative families:

Respect is a key value

This style of leadership treats kids with respect but importantly, expects respectful, considerate behaviour from children in return. When kids fail or forget to practise respectful treatment of others they are respectfully brought into line and reminded of their responsibility to others.

Kids contribute

Kids in collaborative families generally help out without being paid. A jobs' roster is the preferred method for ensuring kids contribute as authority is diverted from parent and rests with the group instead.

Language is cooperative

Parents who adopt a collaborative approach generally use language that invites children to cooperate. They also use the word "We" a great deal. "We're relying on you to set the table before dinner" reminds a child or teenager of their contribution to the family good.

Rituals are strong

Collaborative families also use rituals such as mealtimes, special days and the like to build strong family bonds. These structured get-togethers are balanced with plenty of informal, fun activities where members can enjoy each other's company.

Decision-making is shared

Most parents who successfully adopt a collaborative leadership style have a process that engages kids in family decision-making and resolution of conflict between siblings. A regular family meeting or council is a common forum used by collaborative family leaders. These meetings may take time to get right and some effort to convince all family members of their benefits, however once they're embedded they become an invaluable part of a family's culture.

There are many ways and methods you can use to successfully raise a family, however not every method stands up to the scrutiny close of quarter living we've been encountering. With more time at our disposal, a wonderful opportunity exists to implement a collaborative leadership style, that will bring benefits well after the COVID-19 pandemic.
